
DÉFINITIONS

• Equidistance

If α , β are in the same minimal domain, they are equidistant from γ .

Chomsky (1993:184)


Le domaine minimal de V, par exemple, est constitué par le VP entier à l'exclusion de V lui-même :



• Exceptional Case Marking (Marquage Casuel Exceptionnel)

Dans l'énoncé ci-dessous, le verbe de la proposition imbriquée (*the students to have understood*) est à temps non fini. I ne peut donc pas attribuer de cas nominatif au sujet. Le filtre du cas oblige tout argument à être marqué casuellement. Pour satisfaire cette contrainte, *the students* reçoit donc le cas accusatif de la part du verbe *believe* :

• I believe the students to have understood.



La pronominalisation de l'argument montre bien qu'il porte le cas accusatif, et non le nominatif:

• I belive them/*they to have understood.

Dans une telle situation, on parle de marquage casuel exceptionnel (ECM) parce qu'un verbe attribue un cas à un argument qui n'est pas le sien.

• Extended Projection Principle (Principe de Projection Etendu)

We may stipulate that a lexical element that θ -marks its subject position (e.g. persuade but not seem) does so if and only if the position is filled, that is, in clauses but only optionally in NPs.

Chomsky (1982:10)

• Instrument Generalization

In order to be realized syntactically, an instrument requires the presence of either an explicit Agent or an implicit argument interpretable as an Agent.

Siloni (2003:394)

• Head Final Filter (Surface Recursion Restriction)

Un constituent de catégorie X placé devant une tête ne peut pas contenir de projection CP, PP ou un autre constituent de catégorie X.

Williams (1981) (Emonds (1976))

• Non-Redundancy Constraint (Contrainte de Non-Redondance)

If the referent of the head noun N implies a property P as part of its frame semantics or encyclopaedic knowledge, then an adjectival past participle is not allowed to simply designate P. It must be further qualified.

Ackerman et Goldberg (1996:21)

• Relativised Minimality Condition (Condition de Minimalité Relativisée)

Y is in a Minimal Configuration with *X* if and only if there is no *Z* such that :

(i) Z is of the same structural type as X

(ii) Z intervenes between X and Y.

Rizzi (2001)

Cette contrainte a pour effet d'interdire la configuration suivante :

*... X_i ... Z ... Y_i ...

Elle oblige tout argument à se déplacer de position argumentale en position argumentale.

• Relativized Uniform Theta Assignment Hypothesis

If a verb α determines theta-roles $\theta 1$, $\theta 2$, ..., θn , then the lowest role on the Thematic Hierarchy is assigned to the lowest argument in constituent structure, the next lowest role to the next lowest argument, and so on.

Larson (1988:382)

• Specified Subject Condition (Condition sur les Sujets Spécifiés)

No rule may relate X and Y in the structure ... X ... $[\alpha ... Y ...] ... X ..., where \alpha is a cyclic node, if there is a (possibly null) subject of <math>\alpha$ distinct from Y and not controlled by X. Ouhalla (1999)

Dans l'énoncé suivant, le DP *Mary* monte de la position de sujet de la seconde proposition imbriquée *to win* à la position de sujet de la proposition imbriquante, en passant par la position sujet de la proposition imbriquée intermédiaire :

• $[_{IP} Mary_i appears [_{IP} t_i to be likely [_{IP} t_i to win]]]$

Dans l'exemple ci-après, en revanche, le DP *Mary* monte directement dans la position sujet de la proposition imbriquante parce que celle de la proposition imbriquée intermédiaire est déjà instanciée par le pronom explétif *it* :

• $[_{IP} Mary_i appears [_{IP} it is likely [_{IP} t_i to win]]]$

Ce type de mouvement est appelé « super raising » et rend les énoncés agrammaticaux.

• Tensed S Condition (Condition sur les S (CP) Tensés)

No rule may relate X and Y in the structure $...X...[\alpha...Y...]...X...,$ where α is a cyclic node, if α is a tensed (finite) clause.

Ouhalla (1999)

Un groupe nominal ne peut pas être extrait d'une proposition tensée qui exclue la position cible :

• *[$_{IP}$ Mary_i seems [$_{IP}$ t_i [Aux Tense] [$_{VP}$ has solved the problem]]]

Dans cet énoncé, le DP *Mary* monte de la position de sujet de la proposition non-infinitive imbriquée vers la position sujet de la proposition imbriquante, rendant l'énoncé agrammatical.

• Theta Criterion (Critère Thématique)

Each argument bears one and only one θ -role, and each θ -role is assigned to one and only one argument.

Chomsky (1981:36)

• Uniformity of Theta Assignment Hypothesis (UTAH)

Identical thematic relationships between items are represented by identical structural relationships between those items at the level of D-structure.

Baker (1985:57)

• Wh- Island Condition (Contrainte sur les Ilots wh-)

It is difficult for a wh-phrase to escape out of a wh-island, i.e. a clause whose C position dominates a wh-phrase.

Ouhalla (1999)

• $[_{CP} [which way]_i do [_{IP} you think [_{CP} (that) [_{IP} John went t_i]]]]$

 $\cdot *[_{CP} [which way]_i do [_{IP} you wonder [_{CP} why [_{IP} John went t_i]]]]$
